LIME Trust Vision & Values

Putting Learners First is our Trust vision.

We aim to create a nurturing and supportive learning environment for all, encouraging our learners to achieve academic excellence and reach their full potential. We set high expectations and build capacity-rich schools through facilitating school-to-school collaboration. Self-worth creates a culture where all learners, all employees and our wider community have pride in their contributions and feel confident and valued.

Partnership is working together for the common good, ensuring that our learners are at the heart of all that we do.

Enjoyment is feeling happy, safe and motivated to make a positive contribution.

Communication provides a voice for all, creating a shared understanding through dialogue.

Trust is a partnership which requires us to act with integrity. Be brave, honest and kind.



Governance

Where a policy refers to the responsibility of the Trust Board for monitoring, scrutiny or quality assurance, these may be delegated to one of the teams below through their governance processes.

- School Improvement Team Governance, who directly report to the Education Curriculum and Standards Committee
- Operations Team Governance, who directly report to the Finance Risk and Audit Committee
- External and internal audits reported to the Trust Board

Trust Policy Statement

The purpose of this policy statement is to ensure that all employees of Lime Trust understand their responsibility to safeguard and minimise the risk of harm to children and young adults.

Safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children is defined in Keeping Children Safe in Education (2025) as: *“providing help and support to meet the needs of children as soon as problems emerge; protecting children from maltreatment, whether that is within or outside the home, including online; preventing impairment of children’s mental and physical health or development; ensuring that children grow up in circumstances consistent with the provision of safe and effective care; taking action to enable all children to have the best outcomes.”*

Children includes everyone under the age of 18.

Where a child is suffering significant harm, or is likely to do so, action should be taken to protect that child. Such action might be taken under Section 47 and Section 44 of the Children Act 1989. Action should also be taken to promote the welfare of a child in need of additional support, even if they are not suffering harm or are at immediate risk. Such action might be taken under Section 17 of the Children Act 1989.

Principles

- Lime Trust believes that safeguarding is its primary responsibility and that everyone who works in the Trust with our children and young people must share this view and demonstrate the values and vision of the Trust
- Each of our schools must follow the agreed Local Authority model safeguarding policy for the area in which they operate
- Each academy must pay due regard to the priorities, advice and guidance of its Local Safeguarding Children Partnership and the Local Authority Designated Officer (LADO)
- Safeguarding is everybody’s responsibility. Failure to ensure that all policies related to the protection of children are followed could result in dismissal

Roles and Responsibilities

The Teachers’ Standards 2021 state that teachers, including Headteachers, should safeguard children’s wellbeing in accordance with statutory provisions and uphold public trust in the teaching profession by maintaining high standards of ethics and behaviour, within and outside school:

- Learners will: adhere to academy rules regarding conduct and safe behaviour; report anything that worries them to a trusted adult.
- Parents/carers will: work collaboratively with school staff to promote the safety of their children and of other pupils; support their academy to teach pupils about keeping safe by reinforcing key safety messages; report any safeguarding concerns regarding their own children or another pupil to the academy.
- Schools will: ensure that all pupils have a safe and stimulating learning environment and are taught about how to keep safe; train and support all adults involved with their school to appropriately identify and respond to any pupil at risk of harm; work collaboratively with parents and professional agencies to safeguard pupils. In addition to working with their Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL) and/or their Deputy Designated Safeguarding Lead (DDSL), staff members should be aware that they may be asked to support social workers to take decisions about individual children
- Trustees will: ensure their school’s safeguarding policy is applied robustly throughout; review it regularly (at least annually) to ensure the effectiveness and rigour of safeguarding practice at their academy.
- Lime Trust shared service staff will: know, understand and follow the safeguarding procedures for each school within which they work; undertake relevant regular training and updates to ensure their skills and knowledge support them to meet their safeguarding responsibility.



- The Trust Safeguarding Lead will: advise and challenge schools and their staff to support them in deploying best practice to meet their statutory safeguarding responsibilities.

Intended Outcomes

- To enable all learners to feel safe and cared for whilst at schools in our Trust and to ensure that they have a safe place and safe people to whom they can turn.
- To enable all adults involved with our trust to be fully equipped to fulfil their responsibilities in effectively promoting the safeguarding and welfare of all our learners.

What school staff and trustees/governors across Lime Trust need to know?

All staff will be required to read Part 1 and relevant Annexes of the [Keeping children safe in education 2025](#) statutory guidance and the Safeguarding policy for the school they work in at least annually. New members of staff will do this as part of their induction process.

All staff members should be aware of systems within their school to support safeguarding, including reporting systems (CPOMS) and these should be explained to them as part of staff induction. This includes: the school's Child Protection Policy; the school's Staff Code of Conduct; and the role of the DSL/DDSL.

All staff members should also receive appropriate child protection training, which is regularly updated.

What school and Lime Trust staff should look out for

All school and Lime Trust staff should be aware of the signs of abuse and neglect, so that they are able to identify cases of children who may need help or protection.

All staff members are advised to maintain an attitude of *"it could happen here"* where safeguarding is concerned. When concerned about the welfare of a child, staff members should always act in the interests of the child.

There are various expert sources of advice on the signs of abuse and neglect. Each area's Local Safeguarding Children Partnership and Lime Trust Safeguarding Lead should be able to advise on useful material, including training options.

Knowing what to look for is vital to the early identification of abuse and neglect. If staff members are unsure, they should always speak to the relevant DSL/DDSL. In exceptional circumstances, such as in emergency or a genuine concern that appropriate action has not been taken, staff members can speak directly to children's social care.

A child missing from education is a potential indicator of abuse or neglect. School staff members should follow the school's procedures for dealing with children who go missing from education, particularly on repeat occasions, to help identify the risks of abuse and neglect, including sexual abuse or exploitation, and to help prevent them going missing in future. The purpose of this policy statement is to link the safeguarding requirements of the specific local authorities in which our schools are based with national guidance and legislation.



What Lime Trust staff should do if they have concerns about a child?

When staff members have concerns about a child, they should raise these with the school's DSL/DDSL. The DSL/DDSL will usually decide whether to make a referral to children's social care, but it is important to note that any staff member can refer their concerns to children's social care directly.

Lime Trust Schools
